The Sections.

Section 4 Was a pretty quick section

Hawkes Bay North Island Trial 16th-17th July 2022



Looks like Matt Foster going big....Have to say, that is steep, so steep it almost looks like the way they used to film the original Batman series in the '60s where the Bat-guy and Boy Wonder simply walked along a pavement holding onto a rope and then they turned the shot on its side so it looked like a wall...lol. Not that Matty's on a pavement here....although, if you look closely, is that a Loading Zone sign....? Christ, there goes our sport..... This trial would have to have the most fortuitous weather conditions of the year. Wet the week before, wet the week after – bright sun and no wind for both days of the trial!

The first day was set at a property that hasn't been used for a long time, down the Maraetotara Road. Apparently, it was sold but the club managed to get the new owners (a farm corporation) to let them back in. And most fortunate this is, the venue is superb. Typical HB, with grassy rolling farmland containing steep hills and with outcrops of super-grippy rock everywhere. The standard was set quite stiff, with some larger scores further down the grades. There was a number of obstacles in green and apparently in other grades which would allow a clean for top riders but completely stop others. Orange was Matt Foster on 59, Carl Robson was 3rd of 3 in Red with 84 (Luke March 58). Wow, here's one to put in the record book – Cam Judd won yellow in his first ride in this grade, on 44 compared to Kev Pinner on 58 in second. Congratulations to Cam, this is an absolutely stellar result. 8 in the grade. Wayne Furniss took out green (9 riders)



on 28, just one ahead of Grant McEwen and myself on 40. Neil bringing it in on 118, must have been a hard one Neil. Finn Pearce was second in blue (15 riders) on 3 points. Shane Ace lived up to his name and cleaned the day. Zack was 4th on 13, Gavin 6th on

16. Speaking of Boy Wonders....our Camaron killing it!



Day two was at Dartmoor Road, an old favourite that never fails to please. This year the 12 sections were set close to the road for the most part and all down towards the left-hand end from the carpark, so a short loop in a huge property. Experts was

pretty tough but the other grades were won on less than one point per section. Not so many "stoppers" this day, more of a concentration affair. Start was delayed a bit, the cows had been in and ruined 4 or 5 sections which had to be repegged on the day.

Matt Foster was the sole Orange; it took 75 from him. Imagine how tough that is! Our own Carl Robson had 75 in experts, third out of three with Luke March setting the pace on 57. Cam Judd came in second of 8 in yellow on 34 from Kev Pinner on 24. Must have

stirred Kevin up on day one eh Cam? Wiley Wayne Furniss headed up the 9 greens with 11, myself back in 6th with 29, Neil bringing it in on 76. Zack Furniss was fourth on 10 points, Gavin Pearce 8th on 20. So, Ixion took out two grades and a first/second in yellow as newer club members get into stride and surge forward.

By the by, did everyone get the news that MNZ has slashed our annual fees to help members get through our troubling times? Here's the email which went around:

Motorcycling New Zealand [MNZ] would like to announce the following RENEWAL Licence Fees - To take effect from 1st July 2022 - 30th June 2023 MNZ continue to recognise and acknowledge the recent challenges faced by members of our motorcycling community and have taken this into account regarding the below costs.

RENEWAL LICENCE FEES

- Championship Licence \$183.75
- Championship ATV & Trial \$138.75
- Club Licence \$105.00

New/Welcome Back licence fees remain unchanged.

This is effectively a 25% reduction across the RENEWAL Licence options and follows on from the recent decision to waive Club/AGM Fees for 2022.

Permit Fees will remain unchanged through to June 30th 2023.

So, a good news story, right? Except, I got the email at 2:56pm on the 30th June, the day before the discounted fees kicked in and the day after I had just paid the full annual subscription....

So, rightly or wrongly, I was a bit put out: isn't this rewarding members who pay late? Couldn't they have given a heads up? So, I wrote back to them:

I just paid full price for mine yesterday - couldn't have had a heads up about this discount...???

But, ten days later, they still hadn't responded so, a little more irritated, I tried again:

Were you thinking of responding to this email from me sent ten days ago?

Most retailers, including Briscos, will refund the difference between a sale price and full price when a customer pays full price and the item goes on sale within 24hrs. Overnight notice (on 30th June) of a fee reduction (from 1st July) by you clearly falls within the principle of fairness that retailers deem to justify a refund.

Clearly, you're not a retailer but the principle remains the same. In fact, your organisation exists purely to serve its members, not profit from random and unexpected policy/fee changes with virtually no warning.

Further, the fee reduction, in your words, recognises the pressing circumstances of our times, something which you have decided affects your members as much as anyone else in our society. Why, then, should I not qualify for it purely because I was unlucky enough to pay the full fee before you decided to notify your members?

Your timing and lack of forewarning is, frankly, bad policy, creating an arbitrary division between those who paid full fees and those who enjoyed the benefit of the reduction based on randomness, the worst possible criterion for generating a sense of fairness amongst members.

Well, they came back this time and it came right from the top and it wasn't pretty...

Good Afternoon Phil - Thank You for your email

I do not usually engage my time in such correspondence, however, your tone warranted a reply

I appreciate what you mention below, however the decision to not refund remains in place. You, as a member, will benefit from the reduced licence costs at the other end as you renew on/before 30th June 2023 and you will get the discounted rate for your 2023-2024 licence[s] as this offer is running through the year [July 2022-June 2023]

There is no 'perfect date/time' to set regarding these decisions - regardless of how/when we did this, we were [clearly now] always going to get people questioning and unhappy, as many as those who actually acknowledge and appreciate what we have looked to do for our membership.

It should be noted that MNZ were by no way obligated to consider such reductions, the decision was that of the Board and MNZ staff as a gesture of goodwill and as mentioned, acknowledgement of recent times - With there being no obligation, it is disappointing that people have responded with what I unfortunately view as a level of expectation.

To confirm, you will benefit from this upon renewal in 2023

Can I end in saying, the tone of both of your emails below, is without any acknowledgement of persons or personnel at all - making it 'demanding and, from us, poorly received'

I trust this gives you clarity, this now puts an end to the matter from MNZ's side


....with no punctuation, not even a fullstop....just brutal.

Congratulations to Phil the wordsmith for his ongoing efforts with Cycle Torque. I made an offhand suggestion a while ago that I would like to see CT revert to monthly so we can lessen our reliance on APB emails and said I would be happy with lesser product if that was the trade-off required.

Well not only has he upped the quantity but the quality as well so great work there me old mucker! And all you happy club members can reward him with beer, or better still articles for him to publish.

Next month we're back in the Maungies on the 7th for a club trial, Manawatu will be doing something somewhere on the 21st, Pioneer have SI Champs on the 20 / 21 and Mid West are somewhere TBA on the 28th so no excuses for not riding something next month.

In the process of doing our entry form with Emily I reviewed previous versions, the Hawkes Bay one from July and the MOMS (with August updates). Oh dear oh dear oh dear what a complicated little world we have created for ourselves ...

Oh, what tangled web we weave ... (Satire by Anne Opinion)

Let's start with riders who aspire to be champions – ie who are serious and have Championship Licenses ...

- You are automatically an Expert but there are some age, sex and technical sub classes.
- First you enter one (and only one) age CLASS Junior is 12 to 16, Veteran 1 is 50 to 64, Veteran 2 is 65+ and if none of those apply you default to Senior which is 17 to 49. But wait there's more the applicable age is "the date of the first day of an event or series" so for this years NITC it's how old you were on the 23rd April 2022.
- Still going you may <u>also</u> qualify to be CLASSed as a Woman, a Twin shock or an Air-cooled bike as well.
- Now we get to the GRADE. All the championship classes are VCS so higher graded riders will automatically beat lower graded riders, so you select a colour Orange, Red, Yellow, Green, Blue or White to ride.
- If you are serious about trophy hunting don't just think about riding well but riding badly too – you are allowed to fail (either not ride or get a Five) in up to 80% of the sections. If you think you can get through at least NINE sections in a FORTY section trial in a higher grade than usual do it, it may get you one up on your mate(s), or exmates if it comes off and you don't wreck yourself or your bike.

If you aren't serious enough to go championship hunting, or can't afford a championship then we have a class for you:

- Intermediate, Sportsman and Clubman classes are offered but you must ride Yellow / Green / Blue grades respectively. Strange that's there is no White but there you go.
- Downside is that there is no "series" as such so you can't get recognised as the North Island Sportsman of the year, only that you won the event...

We shouldn't overlook the Mini's (horrible name, stolen from the Yee Hah people. Should be Juniors with the Teenage classes called Youth!) which started out simple and then suddenly got hard.

What was the Mini Red, Yellow and White now becoming a Grade and overridden by new Classes – Mini 1 (4 to 7), Mini 2 (8 to 11) and Mini 3 (12 to 14). I strongly suspect there are now more entry options than riders...

CLUB CONTACTS

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Cycle Torque is presented for the entertainment of the members and nothing herein is warranted to be factual or the opinion of the club or even of the person whose opinion it was at the time. Cycle Torque is generally published the week before the club's regular event, the wonderful <u>Ixion Club</u> <u>Trial</u>; which is generally held on the first Sunday of the month, rain hail or shine. Sections are set to cater from everyone from raw beginner to NZ championship "A" grade; something for everyone. Be there at 9am for a 10:00 start at the latest. Finish time is 3pm or when everyone is finished, whichever is sooner. There's time for quick lunch after the first round if you don't mess about too much. Cost: \$15 per rider, \$5 for students. Please bring \$5 notes and be aware due to insurance requirements that there is **NO RIDING AT ALL BEFORE YOU SIGN UP.**

DOGS are strictly forbidden at Trials because we ride due to the kindness of the farmers who own the land. Dogs make farmers unkind. The last 10 riders to sign in each get to bring in the pegs for one section. So turn up early if you want to leave early! See the President about this, the rules are not applied strictly. Brand new people can ride without an <u>MNZ license</u> for two trials; after that it is necessary to join MNZ (Motorcycling NZ), our national body. It's a cool hundred bucks a year, or \$130 for a champs licence, which is only necessary for Junior, President and Expert classes at Island or National level. In addition to the Club Trial, Ixion generally holds a two-day <u>North Island</u> <u>Championship Trial</u> each year, which is considered (by <u>all</u> Ixion members) to be the premier event in the World Trials Calendar. There are sometimes <u>Twilight Trials</u> during the summer starting at 3pm, often followed by a BBQ. The friendly <u>Committee Meeting</u> is held on the Tuesday after the Club Trial at the Lighthouse in Pauahatanui at 7:30 pm. Ring Kevin to make sure, before turning up. Club <u>fees</u> are \$40 per year and \$20 for fulltime students or social members, \$60 for families. These very reasonable fees are unchanged since the AGM, so pay up and as always ...
